Friends & Relatives,

2006 was dominated by the Iraq war and nuclear proliferation. An increasingly complex world has made American's, the majority of who have a weak grasp of foreign affairs to begin with, rather capricious.

The U.S. population hit 300 million and the domestic economy is back on solid footing after a prolonged recession. Unemployment is down to 4.5%, inflation is low, and consumer confidence is high. Voters shook up the house and senate in mid-term elections. It was more of a vote of no-confidence for republicans than it was a win for democrats. A terribly run war and despicable congressional behavior made the change inevitable. Donald Rumsfeld was replaced by Robert Gates (former Director of Central Intelligence) as the Secretary of Defense.

To be fair, of all the places I've lived in or visited in this world I have never met individuals that can do such amazing things as American's. After all, who else can claim such life altering inventions as the airplane, the light bulb, the telephone, the Personal Computer, or the Internet? We have reaped and displayed the benefits of democracy and the right to private property more than any other nation. There is no civilization in history that has improved life for our species as much as we have. And, we continue to concentrate on and are world leaders in industries where future growth lies. Industries like communications equipment, software, aerospace, chemicals, alternative energy, pharmaceuticals, biotechnology, and entertainment. Most of these industries have the potential to dramatically change the world similar to the recent advent of the Internet. For example, breakthroughs in alternative energy alone will simultaneously arrest global warming, reduce dependence on foreign oil, and improve our trade deficits.

As for us, we're still living in the San Francisco Bay Area, working in the high-tech industry. Andrew's in 9th grade, Liam's in elementary school. We're consistently "too busy", which seems to be inherent with living in the Silicon Valley.
