The year saw hurricane Harvey slam Houston, wildfires burn the west coast, and Donald Trump sworn in. A da Vinci <u>painting</u> that a couple of art geeks bought in Louisiana 12 years ago for \$10,000 sold at auction for \$450 million and Bitcoin hit \$17,000; if you bought \$100 worth of Bitcoin in 2010, it's worth \$21 million today.



N. Korea tested a hydrogen bomb and now has intercontinental ballistic missiles that can reach anywhere in the United States. King Assad used chemical weapons in his civil war; the Trump administration responded by wiping out a Syrian airbase with 50 cruise missiles. There was no clear motive why Stephen Paddock killed 58 people at a Las Vegas concert from a snipers perch he setup in a luxury hotel. James Hodgkinson, an ardent Bernie Sanders supporter whose Facebook page read like liberal talking points from MSNBC & CNN, shot 5 republican congressmen at a baseball field because he disagreed with their politics.

Researchers detected gravity waves (which bend space and time) when two neutron stars collided. Physicists at the CERN electron accelerator in France are attempting to isolate a stable for of antimatter they created (antihydrogen) in a gravitational field to see if it falls down toward gravity or "falls" up away from gravity (which would lead to some truly futuristic devices). 
A small, secretive, wealthy group of individuals directed the anarchist organization Antifa to employ black bloc tactics, dawn hoods & terrorist-like garb, and use weapons & violent tactics to physically attack numerous individuals for simply speaking at colleges across the country. Mexico has the highest rate of chain migration; based on a recent five-year study each Mexican immigrant sponsored 6 additional immigrants. The result of this law is that immigrant families determine who will become citizens. Only 1 out of 15 green cards is issued to an immigrant based on skills, education, or the ability to contribute to the nation. It stands to reason that our immigration policy should be based simply on what is best for the United States.

A tax reform bill squeaked by at year-end. \$2.6T is parked overseas and it's obvious that lowering the corporate tax rate will bring \$billions home. Most nations encourage their domestic companies to repatriate profits earned abroad with low tax rates. Unfortunately, the bill does not cut individual taxes as much as it shifts them between classes. There was no discussion on reducing the size of federal bureaucracy and the government will still aggressively redistribute income. Out of 326 million people in the country, only 140m citizens pay taxes. Of those, 70m Americans pay 97% of all federal income taxes collected while the other 70m pay the remaining 3%.

With Trump's election, democrats swung hard left, many becoming unhinged. Along with establishment republicans drunk on power, numerous congressmen called for the President's impeachment basically because they oppose his politics. Their rage reflects a sense of entitlement and shows how out of touch they are that they seek to nullify an election. Democrats were once the party of hard-hat-wearing, flag-waving, working-class American's. They now jet around in Gulfstream's to represent liberal elites and leftist mobs. They consistently take an extreme position that benefits some special interest group, sticks the average American with the bill, and subject our nation to collateral damage. They demand obedience, expect your vote, and want your money. Consequently, they've lost most of the country save a handful of large metropolitan areas.

Americans were led to believe that the Trump campaign worked with Russian agents to steal the election from Hillary Clinton. Based on a "dossier" which turned out to be a fake research paper (paid for by the <u>DNC and the Clinton campaign</u> and filtered through a shady law firm to hide relationships) an independent council was appointed to investigate. In an illegal and systematic abuse of power by the prior administration, former UN ambassador Samantha Powers (whose duties did not include making decisions on intelligence) <u>exposed the identity</u> of American's who were secretly spied on by the security agencies Obama controlled. The ultimate tragedy is that a sitting president used American intelligence agencies to <u>spy on</u>, and presumably neutralize, a political opponent. For example, consider just a few of our inventions: the smart phone, fracking, the personal computer, the Internet, the light bulb, the airplane, and the telegraph. 48 years after mankind went to the moon, the only human beings to have set foot on the surface are Americans. This was possible foremost because we created a system of government where a persons' rights are not given to them (or taken away at a whim) by some ruler or entrenched bureaucrat but are inalienable and inherent.

As for us, Monica & I continue to live and work in the San Francisco Bay Area. Wildfires burned 100 houses to the ground within a mile of our place at Clearlake this year.
